The ONS Principal and the Director of Curriculum and Instruction met with the Superintendent to first, complete the Appeal and
subsequently, when the Appeal was denied, to examine the Diagnostic Self Review and Report Template. The ONS Principal And
Director Of Curriculum and Instruction then arranged a meeting with the Assistant Superintendent of OCM BOCES for initial
guidance. In the following weeks, the ONS Principal proceeded to enter information onto the form. With an impending deadline
approaching (11/22/13 for publication), the Superintendent, the ONS Principal and the Director of Curriculum and Instruction met
with another OCM BOCES advisor who has completed numerous LAPS to ensure we were proceeding in the right direction.

The district appealed the decision of having the Onondaga Nation School on the LAP School Designation List. This appeal was rejected. However, we believe the community should be aware of what was send to the NYS Education Department. Below is the appeal sent to the state.

We ask that you please reconsider the designation of the Onondaga Nation School as a LAP school based on the following:

- 1. The Onondaga Nation School has one class per grade level with the average class size of ten (10) students in grades 3-8 with class sizes as low as six (6) students.
- 2. When figuring percentages with these small numbers, one student would impact scores significantly.
- 3. The Onondaga Nation School missed Safe Harbor in 2011-2012 in ELA by one (1) point, attesting to the lack of true portrayal of our progress.
- 4. According to our 2011-2012 Report Card all of our Economically Disadvantaged students achieved AYP (our Native Indian students did not make AYP, yet our entire Onondaga Nation School is Native Americans?).
- The Onondaga Nation School student growth percentile scores in ELA and Math increased by 12.4% from 2010-2011 to 2011-2012, demonstrating our commitment to student achievement.

In addition there are extraordinary conditions which should be considered:

The Onondaga Nation is only one (1) of three (3) schools in New York State that sits on Native American Territory. The Onondaga Nation School is a unique PreK-8 school which resides on the Onondaga Nation Territory. Only Native American students can attend the school. As the State is fully aware, the Nation contracts with the local school district to education the children. The school does not have a Title 1 status as the Onondaga Nation does not accept federal funding in any capacity. The Nation Community understands education as seen by the State Education Department as it relates to ELA, Math, Science and Social Studies; however, the most important value and emphasis is the Language and Culture of the Onondagas. The Council of Chiefs has stated numerous occasions to the State and the School District that the preservation of the cultural heritage needs to be the major focus in the school and community. With this in mind, the school's schedule revolves around language and culture of the Onondagas.

The school, district, and Nation acknowledge that the children of the Onondaga Nation School need to continue to improve in all areas of education. We continue to examine our data, we make decisions based on our data always mindful of the need for our students to be academically proficient. We strive for their success in all areas. The values of the Onondaga Nation Community guide the decisions.

To expect that the traditions, language and culture of a people be superseded by New York State Education Department School Accountability Status would be disrespectful of the agreement the Nation has regarding the education of their children. The children of the Nation are the number one concern of the community and leadership. The requirements that the State Education Department have set in the LAP would compromise the expectations the Council of Chiefs has set forward for the education of the children at the Onondaga Nation School. Therefore, we respectfully, on behalf of the school, district, and Nation request that the Onondaga Nation School be removed from the list of LAP School Designation.
